Course Title: Economic Geography

Course Description:

Introduces the subfield of human geography by focusing on the key interactions of people, space, and economics. Familiarizes students with economic, geographic, political and demographic factors that impact international target markets and trade activity. Focuses on levels of development, urban areas, globalization, and international trade. Lecture 3 hours. Total 3 hours per week. 3 credits

General Course Purpose:

To explain the spatial configuration of economic activities, the process of uneven geographical development, and the role of state, market, and civil society agents in management of the economy. This course will satisfy a social/behavioral science elective or general elective.
